Activity 3 Introducing auxiliary verb to do - Present Simple

Remember

With most verbs an -s is added for the third person singular.

Example:

work-works, live-lives, speak-speaks

If the verb ends with an -s, -sh or -ch, -es is added.

Example:

go- goes, do-**does**, scratch-**scratches**

If a verb ends with a consonant plus -y the -y is replaced by an -ies.

Example:

fly-**flies** try-**tries**

If the verb ends with a vowel the y stays but the s is added.

Example:

stay-**stays** play-**plays**

In question forms 'does' is used for the third person and the main verb is in the infinitive.

Example:

Does she work in the admissions department?

Yes, she does.

No, she doesn't.

Practise making questions using Do and Does.

Example:

Do you go to college every day? Does she like her job?

Key words used with the Present Perfect
ever, never, just, already

Past tense of the verb 'to do'

Did, did not, didn't

The past tense of the verb *To Do* is '*did*'.

'*Did*' is used in questions and negatives in the past for all persons.

Regular and irregular verbs

The regular Past Tense verbs have *-ed* at the end

want-wanted, work-worked,

But, *love-loved*

operate-operated

Irregular verbs - some change completely, whereas some stay the same,

go-went, have-had, speak-spoke

put-put, cut-cut, hit-hit
